Drawing on qualitative and quantitative research from around the world, this book brings together renowned international scholars to explore life-course perspectives on women's imprisonment. Instead of covering only one aspect of women's carceral experiences, this book offers a broader perspective that encompasses women's pathways to prison, their prison experiences and the effects of these experiences on their children's well-being, as well as their subsequent chances of

desisting from crime.

Encompassing perspectives from the Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, Scotland, the United States, Ukraine and Sri Lanka, this book uncovers the similarities across time and space in women offenders' life histories and those of their children and examines the differences in women's experiences and trajectories by shedding light on the moderating effects of particular cultural contexts.

Divided into three parts, each section builds on the previous one. First, gender and the development of gender roles across cultures are introduced. Scientific methods used to study gender, attitudes toward gender, and the latest data and theories on sex differences in cognitive, social, and emotional domains are then introduced. Theories of gender-role development, including evolutionary, social learning, social role, and gender schema theories are reviewed along with the implications of gender on achievement. Part one reviews the key information on the similarities and differences between the sexes and the theories that explain the differences which lay the foundation for the remainder of the book. Part two examines the role of gender in relationships including communication styles and the impact of these interactions on friendship and romantic relationships. The third part examines the role of gender on physical and mental health. The effects of marriage and parenting on health are reviewed, including domestic abuse, along with how gender affects the association between work and health.

This is an ideal text for upper level gender-focused courses including the psychology of gender, psychology of women or men, gender issues, and gender, women's, or men's studies taught in psychology, women's studies, gender studies, sociology, and anthropology.

Regulating the Lives of Women Social Welfare Policy from Colonial Times to the Present, 2nd Edition

Widely praised as an outstanding contribution to social welfare and feminist scholarship, *Regulating the Lives of Women* (1988, 1996), was one of the first books to apply a race and gender lens to U.S. welfare state history, offering a major corrective to earlier accounts. It successfully exposes how myths and stereotypes built into welfare state regulations define women as "deserving" or "undeserving" of aid based on their race, class, gender – and marital status. Published just after welfare reform's 20th anniversary, this third edition is a timely reminder that public policy continues to punish poor women, especially single mothers, for departing from prescribed wife and mother roles.

Abramovitz's revised Preface highlights Neoliberalism's impact on women and the welfare state since 1996. It explains Neoliberalism as a response to the 1970's economic crisis and identifies the strategies deployed to dismantle the welfare state. Bringing women into the Neoliberal framework, Abramovitz argues that diminished social programs undermine the work of social reproduction carried out by the welfare state

and women at home. Based on considerable new research, the Preface includes current data showing that the three core programs discussed in the book – Public Assistance, Social Security, and Unemployment Insurance – continue to regulate the lives of women in the Neoliberal Era. "Trumpism" promises to worsen the already dire consequences for individuals and wider society.

Well-researched but easy to read, *Regulating the Lives of Women* will appeal undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate students of social work, sociology, history, public policy political science women, gender and black studies –as well as today's activists.

The Routledge Companion to Feminist Philosophy is an outstanding guide and reference source to the key topics, subjects, thinkers, and debates in feminist philosophy. Fifty-six chapters, written by an international team of contributors specifically for the Companion, are organized into five sections: (1) Engaging the Past; (2) Mind, Body, and World; (3) Knowledge, Language, and Science; (4) Intersections; (5) Ethics, Politics, and Aesthetics. The volume provides a mutually enriching representation of the several philosophical traditions that contribute to feminist philosophy. It also foregrounds issues of global concern and scope; shows how feminist theory meshes with rich theoretical approaches that start from transgender identities, race and ethnicity, sexuality, disabilities, and other axes of identity and oppression; and highlights the interdisciplinarity of feminist philosophy and the ways that it both critiques and contributes to the whole range of subfields within philosophy.

New information covered includes: neoliberal feminism, standpoint theory, mujerista psychology (Ch.1); LGBT individuals and individuals with disabilities in media (Ch.2); testosterone testing of female athletes, precarious manhood (Ch.3); raising a gender non-conforming child; impact of social media on body image (Ch.4); gender differences in narcissism and Big Five personality traits, women video-game designers (Ch.5); asexuality, transgender individuals, sexual agency, "Viagra for women" controversy (Ch.6); adoption of frozen embryos controversy (Ch.7); intensive mothering, integrated motherhood, "living apart together", same-sex marriage (Ch.8); single-sex schooling controversy (Ch.9); combat roles opened to U.S. women, managerial derailment (Ch.10); work-hours dilemmas of low-wage workers (Ch.11); feminist health care model, health care for transgender individuals, Affordable Care Act (Ch.12); feminist critique of CDC guidelines on women and drinking (Ch.13); cyberharassment, gendertrolling, campus sexual assault (Ch.14); transnational feminism, men and feminism (Ch.15).

Women's Lives stands apart from other texts on the psychology of women because it embeds within each topical chapter a lifespan approach and robust coverage of the impact of social, cultural, and economic factors in shaping women's lives around the world. It provides extensive information on women with disabilities, middle-aged and older women, and women in transnational contexts. In The News boxes present current, often controversial, news items to get students thinking critically about real-life applications of course topics. Learn About the Research boxes expose students to a variety of research methods and highlight the importance of diversity in research samples by including studies of underrepresented groups.
